2016 Texas Advocates Conference

Got Medicaid? You might be getting STAR Kids instead!

Many parents have recently received a packet from the Medicaid office informing them that their child with disabilities, aged 0 to 20, must switch from "traditional" Medicaid to Texas' new STAR Kids program. The Arc hosted a presentation with Elva Caballero, Regional Manager of MAXIMUS, to discuss how this change will affect services. Parents were able to discuss their options with insurance agencies offering STAR Kids and then signed up with an agency on-the-spot.

STAR Kids is a new Texas Medicaid managed care program that will provide Medicaid benefits, beginning November 1, 2016, to children and adults 20 and younger who have disabilities. Participation in the STAR Kids program is required for those who are 20 or younger, covered by Medicaid, and meet at least one of the following:

- Get Supplemental Security Income (SSI).
- Get SSI and Medicare.
- Get services through the Medically Dependent Children Program (MDCP) waiver.
- Get services through the Youth Empowerment Services (YES) waiver.
- Live in a community-based intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability or related condition (ICF/IID) or nursing facility.
- Get services through a Medicaid Buy-In program.
- Get services through any of the following Department of Aging and Disability Services (DADS) intellectual and developmental disability (IDD) waiver programs.
 - o Community Living Assistance and Support Services (CLASS)
 - o Deaf Blind with Multiple Disabilities (DBMD)
 - o Home and Community-based Services (HCS)
 - o Texas Home Living (TxHmL)

Managed care means that you will pick health plan that will provide the health services you need through a network of doctors, specialists, and other providers. Those enrolling in the STAR Kids program will choose a health plan, as well as a primary care physician or clinic who will provide basic medical services, like check-ups, and provide referrals to a specialist when needed.

Basic medical benefits, coordination of care

STAR Kids is designed to meet the unique needs of youth and children with disabilities. The program will provide benefits such as prescription drugs, hospital care, primary and specialty care, preventive care, personal care services, private duty nursing, and durable medical equipment and supplies. Children and youth who get additional services through MDCP will receive their MDCP services through STAR Kids.

If you or your child lives in a community-based intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability or related condition (ICF/IID) or nursing facility, your long term services will be provided the same way they are now.

If you or your child receives services from any of the following programs, they will be provided the same way they are now:

- Community Living Assistance and Support Services (CLASS)
- Deaf Blind with Multiple Disabilities (DBMD)
- Home and Community-based Services (HCS)
- Texas Home Living (TxHmL)
- Youth Empowerment Services (YES)

If you or your child receives Medicare, your Medicare benefits won't change. You will keep using Medicare for basic health services and medicine ordered by your doctor.

Through STAR Kids, families will also receive help with coordinating care. Each health plan will provide service coordination, which will help identify needs and connect members to services and qualified providers. STAR Kids MCOs will assess each member's service needs, which will be used to help the family and the MCO create an individual service plan.

A core component of the STAR Kids program will be a standard screening and assessment process health plans will use to determine each child's needs as they relate to health and independent living.

Managed Care Organizations

Each health service area in the state will have at least two health plans, or managed care organizations (MCOs), that will provide services through the STAR Kids program.

All the kids drew chalk drawings on the sidewalk and played horseshoes, ring toss, frisbee and football. The little ones also enjoyed all the bubbles. Parents brought plenty of hotdogs, chicken tacos, and tostadas to share. Nobody left hungry.

The final event of the day was the Silly String "free-for-all" war. Lots of laughter from the parents and lots of laments from the kids when their cans ran out.

Mike Marshall partnered with his father, volunteer and board member, Hal Marshall, in level two alternate shot play. Tank Schottle partnered with Mike Wright, also in level two alternate shot play. Golfer Josie Vaiana was unable to attend, but Coach Kelley Moseley says she will fit in well at next year's tournament.

Our players brought home the rainbow of medals: Stevie had gold, Mike had silver, and Tank had bronze. It was an excellent showing all around! Ambassador Training held at The Arc



For the third time in the past year, Margo Pasko provided training for Fort Bend Transit Ambassadors. Ambassadors assist passengers who need that extra bit of help or supervision in order to safely use Fort Bend Transit. ParkWest Staffing Services, Inc. hires the ambassadors for Fort Bend Transit. Margo developed a curriculum and trained 16 ambassadors on the topic of "Interacting with Agitated Passengers". She taught them how to recognize when a passenger is becoming agitated, how to identify" trigger points", when possible, to prevent the agitation and strategies to use to safely "de-escalate" the situation.

The two previous trainings that Margo provided included:

- How to help passengers be more independent in their use of Fort Bend Transit services,
- Who has a duty to report suspected abuse, neglect or exploitation, including how to recognize it and how to report it.

Jalyn Dimmit and Alex McCutcheon, both members of The Arc, are employed as ambassadors and love their jobs helping people.

U.S. Department of Education Releases Guidance to Schools on Ensuring Equity and Providing Behavioral Supports to Students with Disabilities

The U.S. Department of Education's Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) issued guidance in the form of a Dear Colleague Letter (DCL) that emphasizes the requirement that schools provide positive behavioral supports to students with disabilities who need them. It also clarifies that the repeated use of disciplinary actions may suggest that children with disabilities may not be receiving appropriate behavioral interventions and supports. When schools fail to consider and provide for needed behavioral supports through the Individualized Education Program (IEP), it is likely to result in children not receiving the free appropriate public education to which they are entitled under federal law.

"All students, including those with disabilities, should have the supports and equitable educational opportunities they need to be successful in school," said U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King Jr. "It's our duty as parents and educators to ensure that children who show up at school to learn get the maximum out of their educational experience. This guidance will help schools create a safe, supportive learning environment for those students who need additional behavioral supports and services to help them thrive."

Current law allows educators to remove students with disabilities from their classrooms if the student violates a code of conduct. Data indicates students with disabilities are disciplined at far higher rates than their non-disabled peers. The DCL includes two resource documents to assist teachers and school leaders. The Department is providing supports to assist teachers with classroom management strategies and assist schools in implementing school wide behavioral efforts to create safe and effective environments where all students are given an opportunity to positively engage in their education.

To better address school discipline and to shine a spotlight on inequities, the Department has updated its school discipline webpage,#Rethink Discipline. This online tool contains data, graphics, and other information on the prevalence, impact, and legal implications of suspensions and expulsions; resources on effective alternatives; and ways to effectively create positive school climates. The webpage also highlights the disproportionate rate at which black students, particularly black males, receive out-of-school suspensions, and data on suspended preschoolers, by race and gender.
